YOUR PATRONAGE, YOUR WAY

Raccoon Valley Electric Cooperative (RVEC) staff work diligently to find ways to make our work more efficient while providing

additional services and information for our member-owners.

Over the years, the co-op has opted to return your patronage dividend as a check, which gives members control over how to spend the money. Alternatively, receiving your patronage as a bill credit directs your dividend to offset a power bill in the month the credit is issued.

To continue serving our memberowners, we have made a recent software update that now allows RVEC to provide members with the option of taking patronage dividends in either a check or in a bill credit. All member-owners can expect to receive a letter from RVEC in the coming weeks giving them the option of taking future patronage retirement dividends

as a bill credit. Receiving a check will remain an option.

Upcoming patronage check

In September, the RVEC board of directors voted to retire a portion of patronage allocated in 2002. Member-owners of record that year will still receive a patronage dividend by check in December.

Since 2010, RVEC has retired \$3,400,000 in patronage allocation to our member-owners. Allocation and retirement of patronage to memberowners is an important difference between electric cooperatives and investor-owned utilities.

RURAL ELECTRIC YOUTH TOUR 2024

Win a trip to Washington, D.C.!

An all-expenses-paid trip to Washington, D.C., June 15-21, 2024, and a \$500 scholarship will be awarded to one high school student from the Raccoon Valley Electric Cooperative (RVEC) service area.

Youth Tour contest applicants must currently be a high school sophomore or junior residing in the RVEC

service area, either town or country. However, an applicant's parents DO NOT need to be RVEC members.

Based on an open-book exam and essay, the top three applicants will participate in face-to-face interviews. RVEC will award one winner a one-week, all-expensespaid trip to Washington, D.C., as part of the electric cooperative Youth Tour. The winner will also receive a

\$500 scholarship for the first year of college or secondary school.

Applications must be received in the RVEC office by Jan. 5, 2024. The open-book exam and study materials will be mailed after Jan. 5, 2024.

BASIN ELECTRIC POWER COOPERATIVE SCHOLARSHIP AVAILABLE

Dependents of Raccoon Valley Electric Cooperative (RVEC) members are eligible to apply for a \$1,000 scholarship from Basin Electric Power Cooperative, which supplies power for RVEC.

The scholarship program is designed to encourage and recognize the achievements of a student living on electric cooperative lines. The scholarship must be used for educational costs, and the student must enter college in the fall of the

school year for which the scholarship is given. The applicant must be a student who is enrolled or planning to enroll in a full-time graduate or undergraduate course of study at an accredited two-year, or four-year college, university or vocational/technical school.

This scholarship is awarded without regard to other awards, loans or financial assistance the applicant may have obtained. Award of the scholarship is based on the following criteria: SAT/ACT scores, grade-

point average, work experience, participation in school and community activities, a statement by the student explaining educational and career goals and a written recommendation by a third party. Application forms can be obtained from RVEC.

Application forms are due to RVEC by Jan. 15, 2024.

PROPERTY TAXES PAID

Property taxes are used to help fund essential things such as education and city and county government. You might not be aware of it, but your cooperative pays property taxes. Raccoon Valley Electric Cooperative (RVEC) receives a tax bill for the poles, wires, transformers and other equipment out on the line, and another tax bill for the office and warehouse. RVEC pays taxes in nine different counties that we serve.

To the right is a breakdown of the property taxes paid in 2023.

PATRONAGE RETIRED

The Raccoon Valley Electric Cooperative board of directors allocates excess margins to a member-owner's patronage account by year based on the percentage of dollars the member paid to the co-op during that year.

Your board of directors approved retiring the general patronage

allocated for a portion of 2002. If you were a member-owner that vear, your check was issued at the beginning of December. Please cash your check promptly.

The board reviews the cooperative's financial position each year to determine when additional refunds will be made.

INVESTING IN YOUR ELECTRIC **SYSTEM**

Electricity is first generated at power plants, then transmitted through transmission lines to substations and finally delivered to our member-owners through distribution lines. Power travels on Raccoon Valley Electric Cooperative (RVEC) distribution lines to transformers that drop the voltage level down so it can be safely delivered directly to homes and businesses.

Distribution lines can be seen supported by wooden poles along many highways, gravel roads and city streets. These lines and poles deliver the power that turns on and runs the appliances we use every day to keep our food fresh, clothes clean and homes cool or warm.

RVEC owns and maintains 1.447 miles of line that safely provides reliable power to our more than 2,085 member-owners.
