The winter moratorium ends April 1, 2023. If your account(s) is past due, you will need to come in or call the office to make arrangements by March 31, 2023, to avoid disconnection of your electrical service.

After April 1, 2023, we do not have to post your premise with a 24-hour disconnection notice. Disconnection may occur immediately. Take the necessary steps to avoid this situation.


# ELECTRIC CO-OPS ADVOCATE FOR RURAL IOWA PRIORITIES DURING 2023 LEGISLATIVE SESSION

More than 150 directors, managers and employees from Iowa's electric cooperatives discussed priorities with more than 100 state legislators on Jan. 10 during our 2023 Welcome Back Legislative Reception in downtown Des Moines. The Iowa Association of Electric Cooperatives hosted the annual reception with the Iowa Biotechnology Association, the Iowa Communications Alliance, the Iowa Institute for Cooperatives and FUELIowa.

The event provided a valuable opportunity to meet with state legislators at the beginning of the 2023 Legislative Session to discuss issues that impact rural electric cooperatives and the communities we serve. For example, we're concerned about secretive industrial and commercial corporations seeking to circumvent lowa's electric service territory laws; these protections exist to provide stability for lowa homes, farms and businesses. Iowa's electric co-ops are also opposed to any legislation that would deny landowners the option to use their property for utility-scale solar generation if they choose.

"It was a great opportunity to talk about rural Iowa issues that impact our communities and our memberowners," says Raccoon Valley Electric Cooperative Board President Dave Onken.

In the coming months, the Iowa General Assembly will address many issues, including energyrelated matters central to Iowa's rural economy. Electric co-op directors, managers and staff will again be important advocates for a balanced approach to address energy issues. Collectively, Iowa's locally owned electric cooperatives provide affordable, reliable, safe and environmentally responsible power to more than 650,000 Iowans throughout all 99 counties every day.

SmartHub allows you to view and change account information, notify **Raccoon Valley Electric Cooperative** of account inquiries and make payments in a secure environment - right from your mobile device, computer or tablet. You can monitor and analyze your electric use all at the touch of a button! This service will help manage your account and free up your time with the convenient and no-cost tool.

Go to www.rvec.coop and click on "view and pay my bill" to register for the service. SmartHub is also available as an app for smartphones and tablets. The app is free and can be downloaded from the Apple App Store and the Android Market.

The lowa Utilities Board requires that all non-rate regulated utilities post the following notice to its membership: If a member-consumer has a problem with his/her service, please write or call the office headquarters:

## NON-DISCRIMINATION STATEMENT

In accordance with Federal civil rights law and U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) civil rights regulations and policies, USDA, its Mission Areas, agencies, staff, offices, employees, and institutions participating in or administering USDA programs are prohibited from discriminating based on race, color, national origin, religion, sex, gender identity (including gender expression), sexual orientation, disability, age, marital status, family/parental status, income derived from a public assistance program, political beliefs, or reprisal or retaliation for prior civil rights activity, in any program or activity conducted or funded by USDA (not all bases apply to all programs).

The letter must contain the complainant's name, address, telephone number, and a written description of the alleged discriminatory action in sufficient detail to inform the Assistant Secretary for Civil Rights (ASCR) about the nature and date of the alleged civil rights violation. 
